

Patience, simplicity and serving others were cornerstones of her commitment to devoting 50 years as food service director. Her smile, gentleness and generous heart will be remembered.




Sister Rosalia (Christine) Costello, CSA

"It is a happy surprise!" exclaimed Sister Helen Pape when asked how she feels about her 100th birthday. Born February 28, 1908, in Evanston, IL, Sister Helen grew up with five brothers and sisters. She entered the Congregation of Sisters of St. Agnes in Fond du Lac, WI, following high school. Sister Helen earned her teaching degree from Marian College in Fond du Lac and taught elementary school from 1930 to 1978. "I taught all of the grades from grade 1 to 8, but my favorite was 1st grade." Her career took her to thirteen parishes, including: Harlem, NY; Two Rivers, WI; Muncie, IN; and Evanston, IL.

She recalls that her students referred to her as a kind and creative teacher.

Prior to retiring, Sister Helen's closing ministry called her to visit elderly church members of St. Nicholas Parish in Evanston. Presently, she lives at the retirement community, Nazareth Center, in Fond du Lac with other retired members of the congregation. She is known for her happy disposition and her gentle, peaceful spirit.

One year after Hurricane Felix

Those of us who minister in Puerto Cabezas, Nicaragua, extend deep gratitude to each person who offered gifts of prayers and monetary donations for the rebuilding of our schools following the destruction of Hurricane Felix on September 4, 2007. The two schools, Colegio Niño Jesús, and the Maureen Courtney Special Education Center, have benefitted tremendously from donations that yielded reconstruction of roof tops and classrooms. We are, however, still in need of doors, windows, and paint to protect the buildings' interior and exterior from the elements. Protective fences are needed for both



schools because they are positioned so closely to the ocean which poses security risks for our students.

In this past year, not only have we experienced the traumatic after effects of Hurricane Felix, but we also witnessed many blessings such as the collaboration of parents, city workers, teachers, families, and friends. The commitment and cooperation of those who helped served to lower the cost of labor so that we could responsibly stretch your donations to purchase more construction materials and building supplies. One of the most vivid sights that personified hope and renewal happened as we celebrated the Independence of Nicaragua holiday. It was emotionally thrilling to witness the Maureen Courtney Center students proudly marching in the parade with their newly painted and repaired drums. The thunder of the drums resonated within our hearts, and once again, we celebrated the abundant blessings brought about by your generous gifts.

We wish blessings upon all whose donations serve to promote the integral education of the Nicaraguan children and youth.

Blessings within Navajo Tradition

The Navajo Indian Reservation is the largest reservation in the United States, covering over 27,000 miles in New Mexico and Arizona. Members of the Congregation of Sisters of St. Agnes have lived and worked in the Gallup Diocese located in New Mexico and Arizona for over 30 years. The Sisters have taught in both public and Catholic schools, worked in health care, and parish ministries.

Sister Josephine Goebel has ministered on the reservation as a Pastoral Minister and Director of Religious Education for the past 20 years. "It is an honor and privilege to be invited into the lives of the Navajos. Over the years I have come to know many Navajo families. The Navajo people are a very prayerful people and have a prayer for everything – for the dying of yarn, for traveling, and the start of a new day. Prayer is woven throughout their daily lives," shared Sister Josephine.

The unemployment rate is 43% in this area, and it is not uncommon for people to come to our convent door needing food. "As Sisters of St. Agnes, we strive to support these people who are in great need. We could not fulfill CSA's mission without your generosity and prayers."
