ichelle Majewski joined Marian
University in 1987 as a faculty member
in the psychology department. During her time there,
she became program director, department chair, and the
dean of two different schools within Marian University.
In 2018, she retired from her teaching career and took
a part-time position working for the Congregation of
Sisters of St. Agnes as Sponsorship Advisor. In 2020, just
as the pandemic was beginning to unfold, Michelle took
on the role of Acting President and was named Marian's
17th President just six months later.

During her 37 years at Marian, she founded the *Journal of Homeland Security Education*, received the "Underkofler Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching" award, retired the university's debt by raising \$12.1 million, launched the Construction Management and Risk Management and Insurance programs, and led the renovation of a new, state-of-the-art nursing space. Just prior to her retirement in May 2024, Michelle was recognized with the Titan 100 award, a program recognizing the top 100 CEOs and C-level executives in the state.

Beyond her large list of accomplishments, Michelle is also appreciated as a relational leader. "By maintaining connections with colleagues and sharing ideas, I demonstrate that I value others' ideas," said Michelle. "I possess a 'can do' attitude that communicates my excitement for student, faculty, and administration achievements, and I seek growth opportunities and invite others to engage in purposeful discourse toward those objectives."

Sister Sharon Pollnow, CSA General Superior, said, "Dr. Michelle Majewski's retirement means a great loss for Marian University. We are grateful for her years of dedicated service to the Mission, both as a professor and as President, for thirty-seven years. Her wisdom, passion, and spirit will continue to live on at Marian. We wish her only the best as she transitions."

The Congregation of Sisters of St. Agnes offers profound gratitude for President Majewski's exceptional service to Marian University.

n June 12, 2024, CSA Associate Frances Grace celebrated her 100th birthday and, just a few weeks later, was celebrated again as a 15-year associate jubilarian.

Frances Grace was born in Yonkers, New York, into the same family as CSA Sisters Emily Schug and Mary Frances Schug. As children, they were taught by Agnesians serving at Sacred Heart Parish. While her siblings felt a vocational call to religious life, Frances felt drawn to learning more about associate relationship after reading "Ordinary Sisters" by Margaret Lorimer, CSA.

During her discernment process, she understood and valued how the CSA Sisters were ever willing to try new ways of fulfilling Jesus' work in the world. A sister might start with one mission, but realize that the times were calling her to change her approach and respond to the signs of the times. For example, Mother Agnes and her sisters started as teachers, then added the mission of healthcare when it was needed and continued to broaden their areas of service to the world's needy.

Frances says one of the great blessings for her husband and her was their son Peter, who was born with Downs Syndrome. Peter inspired both of his parents to become involved in work with the disabled. As Frances sought out the special services Peter required, she saw a new mission for herself. Frances formed a group of parents of special needs children who approached doctors and other health professionals about how to give hope to parents confronted with difficult news. Her ministries have included serving as a catechist in the RCIA at Holy Family Parish, visiting and helping residents at St. Francis Home, and assisting at St. Francis Home chapel by giving communion to those less mobile, and serving as a lector and eucharistic minister. Frances currently assists the Associate Office by mailing birthday cards to CSA associates and prayer partners. On her birthday she was thrilled to receive cards of her own. "I got dozens of birthday cards from associates all over the country. What a great surprise!" She celebrated with her five children and their families and then again with sisters and associates all of whom showered her with love.

Sister Julia Pfeifer, CSA

Sister Julia Pfeifer, CSA, baptized Rose Mary, died May 1, 2024, at Nazareth Center, Fond du Lac, Wisconsin. Rose Mary was born in Hyacinth, Kansas, on July 18, 1924. She grew up on a small farm with her twin and fifteen other siblings. After attending Silverdale District 42 rural grade school and earning her high school diploma from Hays High School in Hays, Kansas, she worked at Walker Airforce Base, Walker, Kansas. A shortage of teachers in Ellis County during World War II prompted Rose Mary to enroll at Ft. Hays State College to earn a teaching certificate. She taught for five years in public schools until 1950 when, at the age of twenty-six, she decided to enter St.

Agnes Convent, Fond du Lac, Wisconsin. She pronounced her vows as Sister Julia on August 15, 1953.

Sister Julia received her BS in Education from Marian College, Fond du Lac, Wisconsin. She ministered as a teacher in Hudson, Wisconsin, and at St. Joseph and Holy Family Orphanages in Michigan. For the next fifty years Sister Julia served as teacher, religious education director, librarian, secretary, pastoral minister, and hospital and nursing home visitor in Illinois, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, and Kansas. In 2008, she joined the community of sisters at Nazareth Court and Center where she received loving care until her death in 2024.



Sister Michele Welch, CSA

Sister Michele Welch, CSA, (Dorothy Jean) died peacefully June 8, 2024, at Nazareth Center, Fond du Lac, Wisconsin. Dorothy was born June 19, 1931, in Fond du Lac, the eldest of seven children. After graduation from St. Joseph's School, the family moved to Milwaukee, Wisconsin, where she attended Pius XI High School. Inspired by the sisters who taught her, Dorothy entered St. Agnes Convent in Fond du Lac and professed her vows as Sister Michele on August 15, 1952.

Sister Michele earned a BS in Education from Marian College, Fond du Lac, and a Masters in Teaching Mathematics from Purdue University in Indiana. She was a gifted and beloved educator in elementary

and secondary schools in Indiana, Illinois, and New York. However, her years as a high school teacher in Beloit, Wisconsin, Elmhurst, Illinois, and Fond du Lac were her greatest joy. For her last assignment, she taught for 27 years at St. Mary's Springs Math Department and continued there as a tutor until 2020.

Sister Michele was among the first sisters to reside at the newly built CSA motherhouse in 2002. She retired to Nazareth Court and Center in 2023 where she received loving care for her declining health until the time of her death.



Sister Carol Geels, CSA

Sister Carol Geels, baptized Celesta Theresa, was born on October 2, 1928, in Decatur, Indiana. Celesta was educated by the Sisters of St. Agnes at St. Joseph Elementary School and Decatur Catholic High School. Influenced by the joyful spirit of the sisters there and by her aunt, Sister Ernestine Geels, she entered St. Agnes Convent, Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, and made her profession of vows August 15, 1949, as Sister Carol.

Sister Carol earned her BS in Elementary and Music Education from Marian College, Fond du Lac, and her MS in Education from Marquette University, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. She furthered her education

at St. John's University, Collegeville, Minnesota, Fordham University, Bronx, New York, and St. Mary's University, Winona, Minnesota. For forty-two years, Sister Carol was an elementary school teacher, principal, and music teacher in parish schools in Wisconsin, New York, and Pennsylvania. During her final years of ministry, she taught music at St. John the Baptist School, Jefferson, Wisconsin, and later volunteered at the Monroe Clinic in Monroe, Wisconsin. Throughout her life, Sister Carol served the Sisters of St. Agnes as Apostolic Councilor, Local Coordinator/Administrator at the Motherhouse, and volunteer in the CSA Sponsorship Office, while also assisting with liturgical worship at the motherhouse.

After moving to Nazareth Court and Center, Sister Carol shared her life and her love for music with the sisters there. She died peacefully on June 19, 2024, at Nazareth Court, Fond du Lac, Wisconsin.
